Spring Garden Guide: Prune, Feed & Plant!

Spring is here, and it's time to get your garden in top shape! Whether you're a beginner or a seasoned gardener, this month-by-month guide will keep your landscape thriving. Plus, check out the most stunning fast-growing perennials, shrubs, and dwarf trees to add instant color to your garden!

April: Time to Get Growing!

Selective Pruning. · Prune spring-flowering shrubs like Azaleas and Big Leaf Hydrangeas (Macrophylla) right after blooming to maintain shape.

Deadheading: Deadheading makes your beds look tended to and calms the visitor. Above all, it is good for your plants!

Fertilization: Side-dress perennials with compost for a nutrient boost.

Pest & Fungal Treatment: Apply neem oil to control aphids and spider mites before they take over.

Diagnostic: Watch for powdery mildew or other fungal issues and remove affected leaves immediately.

Future Prep: After the last frost, start planting warm-season annuals to bring color to your garden.



May: Growth Mode Activated!

Selective Pruning: Lightly prune Boxwoods / Hollies to keep them dense and shapely.

Deadheading: Remove spent Rose and perennial blooms to keep them reblooming.

Fertilization: Give annuals and perennials a mid-season boost with liquid seaweed or fish emulsion.

Pest & Fungal Treatment: Introduce ladybugs to naturally control aphids (Mother Nature's tiny exterminators!).

Diagnostic: Monitor for nutrient deficiencies—yellow leaves? Droopy plants? Time to adjust feeding!

Bonus: Spring Fertilization Quick Guide!

With a little TLC, your garden will be bursting with life! So grab your gloves, get in the dirt, and let's make this spring spectacular!

#CharlotteGardenClub #SpringGardening
#PruneFeedProtect #GardenGlowUp

Holly-tone → 1 cup per foot of plant height
(Hydrangeas, Camellias, Hollies, Laurels, etc.)

Plant-tone → ½ cup per foot of plant height
(Boxwood, Sweetbox, Conifers, Yew, Perennials, Grasses)

Gypsum → ¼ cup per foot of plant height
(Boxwood, Sweetbox, Pachysandra)

Roses → Specialized rose fertilizer for the queens of the garden!
